

In May, COVID created the chance to fulfill my Clinical Pastoral Education requirement at Redeemer. Pastor Lisa presented eight pastoral projects which built on my internship.

Bible Study: Wednesdays at noon, we gathered on Zoom and dug into the Psalms.

Pastoral Calling Team: Weekly, a team contacted every household in the Redeemer community to stay connected and catch up on our highs and lows.

Vital Information Update: I reached out to the church community to gather important information spanning from accurate email addresses to hobbies so we can more effectively serve one another.

Confirmation: Helped Pastor Lisa teach confirmation classes.

Men's Group: I worked with Brian Bock to restart the Men's group amidst COVID.

Anti-Racism Workshops: I have been working with Solomon Tesfai to identify consultants to support Redeemer leaders through anti-racism training in the Fall.

Visitor Welcome Strategy: We are developing a plan to build from when we are all in person again. **Project Lunchbox**: Every Thursday at noon, the Redeemer garage becomes an open food pantry for the community.

This summer I experienced an even fuller picture of the day to day work of a pastor.

NEW UPDATESacred Places Grant

What does this mean for Redeemer?

The National Fund for Sacred Places is a nonprofit organization that offers financial support and guidance to historic churches that demonstrate connectedness to their surrounding neighborhoods. Redeemer was one of 45 congregations selected from the entire nation to submit a grant proposal that would help us restore the 1917 sanctuary portion of the building and install modern air conditioning for the space.

We will hear if we are selected as one of the 10 to 12 congregations that will be offered up to \$250,000 to help in our effort to be good stewards of our physical structure, preparing it for ministry in the next decades, God-willing.

The catch is this—in order to receive the maximum \$250,000 we will need to raise \$500,000 in the next three years, making specific goals at specific times.

The council and leaders are ready for the challenge, and we pray and hope Redeemer friends within and outside the congregation will help us meet those goals, too. Stay tuned for an announcement in October!

HAPPY RETIREMENT LISA MYERS


In July, Lisa Myers retired from the federal government after more than 33 years. Her career took her around the world, to some of the most amazing national parks in the country, and finally to her adopted city of Milwaukee just five years ago.

She was a Peace Corps volunteer in Costa Rica, a ranger in Yosemite, Joshua Tree, Great Smoky Mountains, and Sequoia & Kings Canyon National Parks. Then, she spent nine years on the other side of Lake Michigan in management at Sleeping Bear Dunes National Lakeshore in Michigan before studying in Indiana for her masters degree.

Five years ago, after grad school, she came to Milwaukee, switched agencies for a job with the US Forest Service, connecting urban residents to nature. That's when she joined Redeemer with her friends of many years, the Prantil family. In retirement, she plans on staying in MKE, traveling, volunteering, discovering more of Wisconsin, and visiting her very large family in both Boston and Florida.

Hey Redeemer Family, exciting news: I'm attending seminary this fall!

Last November I was fortunate to visit El Salvador with a cohort of Redeemer folks. As we traveled from place to place, learning about the deep theologies of liberation and freedom that have influenced the Lutheran Church there, I felt a deep sense of call coming back to me. This call has been there for years; in high school I hosted "Bible Bonfires" for my friends to talk about religion, in college I created worship experiences and bible studies for my summer camp. Hearing this call in El Salvador didn't surprise me. In fact, it made me realize that *this call isn't going away*.



On our last day, a few of us Redeemer folks ended up in the ocean. I mean, really *out there in the ocean*. We had been swimming and then all of a sudden the waves pulled us out to a place where we couldn't touch. Amid all the chaos of trying to swim back to shore, I felt God's presence in very real, awesome, humbling, and grace-filled ways. The moment my feet touched the sand again, the only thought in my mind was: *I need to go to seminary*.

So I'm going to seminary. Classes start on September 8th and I could not be more excited (I write this in August). I will still be on staff at Redeemer, doing what I do, so don't worry about losing me :)

Financial Giving for Redeemer's Mission



"Hello Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Despite the challenges that COVID-19 has brought to our way of life, as well as our way of congregating, I am filled with joy to see the positive financial position we are in. Currently, our tithes and offerings are up \$8.4K vs. budget, driven by an increase of 30% in online contributions! From an expense standpoint, significant austerity measures in energy/heat/discretionary spend, have helped us drive a major amount of favorability vs. budget, +\$27.8K. Lastly, though not shown below, we have raised \$135K in restoration funding This is a healthy position to be in and allows us greater strength in any other fund raising efforts (i.e. grant match or construction loans). I hope you all are able to enjoy the rest of your summer and fall, and are filled love, optimism, and faith that we will all come through this current challenge."

THE STORMS OF LIFE

Most of you are probably familiar with the story in Mark 4:35-41. Jesus and his disciples were traveling across the Sea of Galilee one evening when a furious squall came up. As the waves broke over the boat, threatening to swamp it, the disciples woke Jesus in a panic asking him, "Don't you care if we drown?"

These days, as we face the uncertain, sometimes frightening realities of this pandemic, it can feel as if we are in a sinking boat during a storm. We may be tempted to ask God, "Don't You care if we get the virus and perish?" Like the disciples, it's normal to question whether God has abandoned us, whether Jesus does not care that our lives and livelihoods are being threatened.

The story in Mark 4 goes on to tell us that after being awakened, Jesus calmed the storm. Then He asked the disciples, "Why are you so afraid? Do you still have no faith?" In other words, "Why are you afraid of storms of life?" Life is filled with storms and tragedies. It's always tornado time. There is no promise that we will be free from the storms of life. God does, however, promise to be with us.

The disciples were letting fear overcome their faith. That fear made them doubt God's care, to question God's character. If we let it, fear will erode our confidence in God's love and faithfulness. Fear can also cause "spiritual amnesia"; it makes us forget that Jesus has been with us all along. Faith doesn't eliminate fear; it silences it, robs it of its power, and draws us closer to God.

We know that there will always be storms. God doesn't send the storms, but Jesus promises to be with us always, to strengthen and care for us. He's in the boat, with us, as we go through the storms. When our world seems to be coming unglued, remember Jesus' words: "Peace! Be still, I am in control." It's a question of trust, and putting our trust in Jesus will help us weather every storm.

During these "stormy days", each of us can put our faith into action. Though many of us are physically separated because of the virus, technology can keep us connected. We can work individually or with others to support those who are in danger of "drowning" during this current storm.

I invite each of us to reach out to those who need support during this stormy time. Offer a life line to someone who is in danger of drowning by calling them, sending a card, or providing financial support. Support Alan Goodman, our official church baker, by purchasing bakery goods or sending a financial donation to keep his small business afloat during the pandemic. Reaching out to others in need will empower us and reduce our fear by putting our own circumstances in perspective.

I'd like to close with a line from a song by Sister Maria Teresa, "Joy is Like the Rain": "Christ asleep within my boat, whipped by wind but still afloat, life is tried by storm." Whipped by wind but still afloat!!! Don't just wait for this storm to pass. Ask God to guide you to reach out and help others in the midst of the storm.

Alan Goodman's startup
Milwaukee bakery was gaining more visibility when
the COVID-19 pandemic
struck, hurting his business.
But he's hanging in there
thanks to community support -- including help from
Redeemer! "The timing --

the divine timing -- just kind of worked out," Goodman said.

Goodman operates A Goodman's Desserts LLC, which sells cookies, cakes and other scratch-baked treats. A Goodman's Desserts was selling items through its website and at farmer's markets when in September 2019 it won the Rev-Up Mke small business plan competition sponsored by Near West Side Partners Inc. Along with winning prizes, including \$10,000 of startup business funding from WaterStone Bank, A Goodman's Desserts also connected with the Ambassador Hotel, an anchor business for the near west side.

Pastor Lisa Bates-Froiland in May approached Goodman about serving as the baker for church social events. That included offering to pay two months rent at the Ambassador's kitchen used by Goodman, with the money donated by church members the Rev. Mick Roschke, a retired Lutheran pastor, and his wife, Judy, a retired teacher. "They just did it out of the goodness of their hearts," Goodman said. "That kind of allyship ... I thought it was awesome," he said. "And really needed."

In a thank you video, posed at the church's Facebook page, Goodman said, "It's good to know that we have partners in the community, and in the struggle, like Redeemer Lutheran Church."

Following a national Interfaith service on August 16 that kicked off the 2020 Democratic National Convention, members of the Interfaith Conference of Greater Milwaukee gathered on the roof of Redeemer Lutheran Church on August 17 for a Milwaukee-focused prayer

message just prior to the start of the convention.

Pardeep Kaleka, Executive Director of the Interfaith Conference and Zeidler Group, led the program with opening remarks:



In 1970, nine Christian denominations and the Jewish community came together to form the Interfaith Conference. Today, there are 21 different Christian and non-Christian member judicatories, organizations that oversee a total of more than 500 congregations. We include mainline Protestants, Roman Catholics, Jews, Muslims, Buddhists, Baha'i, Hindus, Latter-day Saints, Moravians, Pentecostals, Sikhs, Unitarian Universalists, and others.

At our core, we are a humanitarian organization whose motto is, 'To uphold the dignity of every person.'

This year is our 50th Anniversary of celebrating faith diversity and the love for religious pluralism, and just like so many in Milwaukee, we anticipated a much different 2020.

2020 represents a numerical clarity. This year we have been forced to humble ourselves and think about the frailness of our existence. We have been forced to be inconvenienced. This inconvenience and isolation has led to much needed reflection and introspection.

We have been asked to prioritize both our value systems and whom we value. Not having access to all, provided us the opportunity to deepen our relationships to our immediate families and circles. And for some, deepen our relationship with ourselves.

My simple prayer for our city and world is that we trust the vision and the dangers that our creator is attempting to show us, and we come together and invest in a reconnecting with ourselves, with our families, our communities, and this one and only earth that we call home.
